

# Privacy Notice – How we use learner information

### Why do we collect and use learner information?

We collect and use learner information under section 537A of the Education Act 1996, and section 83 of the Children Act 1989. We also comply with Article 6(1)(e) and Article 9(2)(b) of the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR).

#### We use the learner data:

- to support young people in their learning
- to monitor and report on learner progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care to support learners' wellbeing
- to assess the quality of our services
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing
- to support you to decide what to do after you leave college

#### Categories of learner information that we collect, hold and share include:

- Personal information (such as name, unique learner number and contact details)
- Characteristics (such as ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free college meal eligibility)
- Attendance information (such as sessions attended, number of absences and absence reasons)
- Assessment results
- Special educational needs information
- Relevant medical information
- National Insurance Number
- Photo ID

## **Collecting learner information**

Whilst the majority of learner information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the UK General Data Protection Regulation, we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain learner information to us or if you have a choice in this.

## **Storing learner information**

The Oaks keep information about you on computer systems and also sometimes on paper.

We retain your education records until you reach the age of 31, after which they are safely destroyed OR we hold your education records securely until you change college.

There are strict controls on who can see your information. We will not share your data if you have advised us that you do not want it shared unless it is the only way we can make sure you stay safe and healthy, or we are legally required to do so.



#### Who do we share learner information with?

We routinely share learner information with:

- Colleges/providers that the learners attend after leaving us
- Local authorities and their commissioned providers of local authority services
- Awarding Bodies
- the Department for Education (DfE)

We may also share limited learner data with local colleges to enable the moderation of learner assessment outcomes and to support collaborative working through joint analysis.

#### Why we share learner information

We do not share information about our learners with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

In order to meet statutory requirements around appropriate education provision, and to fulfil safeguarding requirements, we share information about college history, and the latest known learner and parent address and contact details in the event of any concerns regarding a learner.

We share learners' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins college funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our learners with the relevant local authorities and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

## Youth support services

We must provide both your and your parent's/s' name(s) and address, and any further information relevant to the support services' role; this will include telephone contact details.

This enables the local authority to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- · careers advice and guidance

Local authorities have a legal responsibility to track all adults with learning difficulties or disabilities up to the age of 25. The purpose of collecting this information is to assist the planning of education and training for young people and the support services they require. Some of the information that is gathered by local authorities is shared with the DfE who use the information to plan at a national level.



This enables them to provide services as follows:

- education and training provision
- youth support services
- · careers advice and guidance

# The Learning Records Service

The Learning Records Service is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about learners in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, colleges, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the Learning Records Service.

The department may share information about our learners with third parties who promote the education or well-being of young adults with learning difficulties and disabilities in in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Under data protection legislation, parents and learners have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
